27 (4) The joint legislative audit and review committee shall conduct an audit of Washington's state research universities. The purpose of 28 29 the audit is to identify cost and profit centers within, and in partnership with, the research universities. The audit must focus on 30 public funds; student fees, in particular tuition; and auxiliary 31 enterprises, which for the purposes of the audit at the University of 32 33 Washington includes University of Washington medical center, the 34 internal lending program, the W fund, and the center for commercialization. The audit at each university much achieve the 35 36 following:

1 (a) Assess the university's policies and practices for tracking 2 per-student expenditures for instruction and identify the average 3 amount per student that the university has spent on instruction for 4 undergraduate students in each of the past five fiscal years;

(b) Obtain the university's definition of auxiliary enterprises and 5 determine the number of auxiliary enterprises, including the University б 7 of Washington medical center, the University of Washington internal lending program, the W fund, and the center for commercialization, that 8 exist in the university system, the methods the university uses to 9 track revenue and expenditures of auxiliary enterprises, and the 10 policies and practices the university has in place to ensure that state 11 funding is not used to supplement or guarantee projects or programs 12 13 authorized by auxiliary enterprises;

14 (c) Identify how much money is being spent on undergraduate 15 education and to what extent undergraduate education is subsidizing 16 graduate education; and

(d) Determine how tuition funds are being used and to what extent they are being used to fund the University of Washington medical center, the University of Washington internal lending program, the W fund, and the center for commercialization and to back bonds authorized by the university.

22 (5) The committee shall conduct a study of the current methods of collecting legal financial obligations and compare those methods with 23 24 other debt collection methods, including contracting for debt 25 collection of legal financial obligations. The study shall include analysis of the costs and revenues of current methods and compare those 26 27 to alternatives, and include analysis of the impact of current methods and alternatives to revenues received by the state. Included shall be 28 an examination of costs and revenue generation before and after the 29 implementation of chapter 379, Laws of 2003 (SSB 5990) and chapter 362, 30 Laws of 2005 (SSB 5256) and analysis of whether these changes met the 31 32 legislative goals of reducing costs and increasing collections. Α report on the results of the analysis shall be presented to the 33 appropriate committees of the legislature by December 2014. 34

35 (6) The committee shall conduct a study of economic development 36 programs and projects supported by the state general fund in the 37 department of commerce. The study shall first review the extent to 38 which these programs: (a) Included specific economic development

targets; (b) monitored economic development targets; (c) required for 1 2 programs which provided support or services through contracts, whether the contracts were structured such that if economic development targets 3 were not met, contracts were reviewed or revised; and (d) changed the 4 5 economic development targets of associate development organizations relative to funding increases since 2007. The study will include the 6 7 feasibility of determining how to isolate other factors, such as general economic trends, from the impacts of economic development 8 programs. The costs and options for conducting future analysis of the 9 10 outcomes specific to economic development programs shall be included and a briefing report shall be provided to the appropriate committees 11 12 of the legislature by December 1, 2013. A complete report with study 13 data and conclusions shall be provided to the appropriate committees of 14 the legislature by December 1, 2014.

(7) The committee shall analyze the incidence and level of taxation and business incentives available to the financial services industry in Washington State, and identify the relative differences in taxes and business incentives compared to California. A report shall be provided to the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 2014.

(8) The committee shall conduct an analysis of how school districtsuse school days. The analysis must include:

(a) How school districts define classroom time, nonclassroom time,
 instructional time, noninstructional time, and any other definitions of
 how the school day is divided or used;

(b) Estimates of time in each category;

26 (c) How noninstructional time is distributed over the annual number 27 of school days;

(d) When noninstructional hours occur;

(e) How noninstructional hours are used, including how much noninstructional time is devoted to professional development for the purposes of teacher and principal evaluation training or common core state standards training; and

33 (f) The extent to which the use of each category of time is 34 identified or defined in collective bargaining agreements.

To the extent data is not available at the statewide level, the committee may use case studies or other methods to conduct the analysis. The committee shall submit a report of its findings to the education committees of the legislature by December 1, 2014.

(9) The committee shall review funding enhancement formulas that 1 2 provide minimum staffing unit funding to small school districts and districts with school plants that have been judged by the state board 3 of education to be remote and necessary. The committee will make an 4 5 assessment of the current formulas and report any recommended adjustments to the legislative fiscal committees of the senate and the б 7 house of representatives by November 1, 2014. In assessing the current formulas, the committee may consider: Enhancements being made to basic 8 education funding in the 2013-2015 omnibus appropriations act and 9 committed to under Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 2261 (chapter 10 548, Laws of 2009) and Substitute House Bill No. 2776 (chapter 236, 11 Laws of 2010); developments in technology or educational service 12 delivery since the formulas were established; practices in other 13 14 states; districts' ability to provide students with access to a program of education; and inter-district equity. 15

(10) The committee shall conduct a study of the effectiveness of 16 17 the state agency performance indicators and performance measurement process established in chapter 43.88 RCW, the state budget and 18 accounting act. The study will focus on the integration of performance 19 measurements into the state budgeting process and the ability of the 20 21 legislative fiscal committees to use effective performance indicators 22 in developing the state budget. The committee shall present its findings and recommendations to the legislative fiscal committees in a 23 24 public hearing during the 2015 legislative session.

25 (11) By June 30, 2014, the committee shall conduct a study of the electricity cost impacts for each qualifying utility to meet the 2016 26 27 and 2020 renewable resource and conservation targets under chapter 19.285 RCW. The study must also include an analysis of the impacts on 28 each utility's commercial, industrial, and residential customers, 29 including an additional analysis of the 30 impacts on low-income residential customers. 31

(12) In carrying out the report required by RCW 44.28.157, the committee shall include by December 2014, an analysis of the impacts of using the Washington health benefit exchange established in chapter 43.71 RCW as a mechanism for providing health insurance for part-time certificated and classified K-12 public school employees. The analysis shall be conducted in coordination with the health care authority and shall include a review of how the exchange, federal health premium tax

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credits and subsidies for out-of-pocket expenses administered through 1 2 the exchange, and Medicaid expansion have impacted, or could impact, health care costs for individuals, school districts, and the state. 3 The analysis shall also include a review of the cost of stand-alone 4 5 dental plans. *Sec. 103 was partially vetoed. (3) \$538,500 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 19 year 2014, \$539,500 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 20 21 year 2015, \$656,000 of the general fund--private/local appropriation, 22 and \$253,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely for children's administration to contract with an educational 23 24 advocacy provider with expertise in foster care educational outreach. 25 The amounts in this subsection are provided solely for contracted education coordinators to assist foster children in succeeding in K-12 26 27 and higher education systems and to assure a focus on education during the transition to performance based contracts. Funding shall be 28 prioritized to regions with high numbers of foster care youth and/or 29 regions where backlogs of youth that have formerly requested 30 educational outreach services exist. 31 The department shall utilize 32 private matching funds to maintain educational advocacy services.

The appropriations in this subsection are subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(a) \$104,999,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 23 24 fiscal year 2014 and \$85,895,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015 are provided solely for persons and 25 26 services not covered by the medicaid program. To the extent possible, levels of regional support network spending shall be maintained in the 27 following priority order: Crisis and commitment services; community 28 inpatient services; and residential care services, including personal 29 care and emergency housing assistance. This is a reduction in flexible 30 nonmedicaid funding of \$4,343,000 for fiscal year 2014 and \$23,446,000 31 for fiscal year 2015. This reduction reflects offsets in state funding 32 33 related to services that will now be funded with federal dollars 34 through the affordable care act medicaid expansion. (10) \$100,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014 and \$100,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015 are provided solely for grants to rural hospitals in Clallam county that were certified by the centers for medicare and medicaid services as sole community hospitals as of January 1, 2013, with less than one hundred fifty acute care licensed beds in fiscal year 2011.

32 (11) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the health 33 care authority shall provide disproportionate share hospital payments 34 to hospitals that provide services to children in the children's health 35 program who are not eligible for services under Title XIX or XXI of the 36 federal social security act due to their citizenship status.

37 (12) \$6,000,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation is
 38 provided solely for supplemental payments to nursing homes operated by

public hospital districts. The public hospital district shall be 1 2 responsible for providing the required nonfederal match for the supplemental payment, and the payments shall not exceed the maximum 3 allowable under federal rules. It is the legislature's intent that the 4 payments shall be supplemental to and shall not in any way offset or 5 reduce the payments calculated and provided in accordance with part E б 7 of chapter 74.46 RCW. It is the legislature's further intent that costs otherwise allowable for rate-setting and settlement against 8 payments under chapter 74.46 RCW shall not be disallowed solely because 9 10 such costs have been paid by revenues retained by the nursing home from these supplemental payments. The supplemental payments are subject to 11 12 retrospective interim and final cost settlements based on the nursing 13 homes' as-filed and final medicare cost reports. The timing of the interim and final cost settlements shall be at the health care 14 authority's discretion. During either the interim cost settlement or 15 the final cost settlement, the health care authority shall recoup from 16 17 the public hospital districts the supplemental payments that exceed the 18 medicaid cost limit and/or the medicare upper payment limit. The health care authority shall apply federal rules for identifying the 19 eligible incurred medicaid costs and the medicare upper payment limit. 20

21 (13) The health care authority shall continue the inpatient 22 hospital certified public expenditures program for the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium. The program shall apply to all public hospitals, including 23 24 those owned or operated by the state, except those classified as 25 critical access hospitals or state psychiatric institutions. The 26 health care authority shall submit reports to the governor and 27 legislature by November 1, 2013, and by November 1, 2014, that evaluate whether savings continue to exceed costs for this program. 28 If the certified public expenditures (CPE) program in its current form is no 29 longer cost-effective to maintain, the health care authority shall 30 report to 31 submit а the governor and legislature detailing cost-effective alternative uses of local, state, and federal resources 32 as a replacement for this program. During fiscal year 2014 and fiscal 33 year 2015, hospitals in the program shall be paid and shall retain one 34 35 hundred percent of the federal portion of the allowable hospital cost 36 for each medicaid inpatient fee-for-service claim payable by medical 37 assistance and one hundred percent of the federal portion of the 38 maximum disproportionate share hospital payment allowable under federal

regulations. Inpatient medicaid payments shall be established using an 1 2 allowable methodology that approximates the cost of claims submitted by the hospitals. Payments made to each hospital in the program in each 3 fiscal year of the biennium shall be compared to a baseline amount. 4 The baseline amount will be determined by the total of (a) the 5 inpatient claim payment amounts that would have been paid during the 6 7 fiscal year had the hospital not been in the CPE program based on the reimbursement rates developed, implemented, and consistent with 8 policies approved in the 2013-2015 biennial operating appropriations 9 10 act and in effect on July 1, 2013, (b) one-half of the indigent assistance disproportionate share hospital payment amounts paid to and 11 12 retained by each hospital during fiscal year 2005, and (c) all of the 13 other disproportionate share hospital payment amounts paid to and 14 retained by each hospital during fiscal year 2005 to the extent the same disproportionate share hospital programs exist in the 2013-2015 15 If payments during the fiscal year exceed the 16 fiscal biennium. 17 hospital's baseline amount, no additional payments will be made to the 18 hospital except the federal portion of allowable disproportionate share hospital payments for which the hospital can certify allowable match. 19 If payments during the fiscal year are less than the baseline amount, 20 21 the hospital will be paid a state grant equal to the difference between 22 payments during the fiscal year and the applicable baseline amount. Payment of the state grant shall be made in the applicable fiscal year 23 24 and distributed in monthly payments. The grants will be recalculated 25 and redistributed as the baseline is updated during the fiscal year. 26 The grant payments are subject to an interim settlement within eleven 27 months after the end of the fiscal year. A final settlement shall be To the extent that either settlement determines that a 28 performed. hospital has received funds in excess of what it would have received as 29 described in this subsection, the hospital must repay the excess 30 amounts to the state when requested. \$3,860,000 of the general 31 32 fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014 and \$1,137,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015 are provided 33 solely for state grants for the participating hospitals. 34

35 (14) The health care authority shall seek public-private 36 partnerships and federal funds that are or may become available to 37 provide on-going support for outreach and education efforts under the 1 federal children's health insurance program reauthorization act of 2 2009.

(15) The health care authority shall target funding for maternity 3 support services towards pregnant women with factors that lead to 4 higher rates of poor birth outcomes, including hypertension, a preterm 5 or low birth weight birth in the most recent previous birth, a 6 7 cognitive deficit or developmental disability, substance abuse, severe mental illness, unhealthy weight or failure to gain weight, tobacco 8 use, or African American or Native American race. 9 The health care 10 authority shall prioritize evidence-based practices for delivery of maternity support services. To the extent practicable, the health care 11 12 authority shall develop a mechanism to increase federal funding for 13 maternity support services by leveraging local public funding for those 14 services.

(16) \$170,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 15 16 year 2014, \$121,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 17 year 2015, and \$292,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to implement Engrossed Substitute House Bill No. 1519 18 (service coordination organizations) and Second Substitute Senate Bill 19 No. 5732 (behavioral health services). If neither of the bills is 20 21 enacted by June 30, 2013, the amounts provided in this subsection shall 22 lapse.

23 (17) \$57,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 24 year 2014, \$40,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 25 year 2015, and \$55,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to develop a report on state efforts to prevent and 26 27 control diabetes. The authority, the department of social and health services, and the department of health shall submit a coordinated 28 29 report to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 31, 2014, on the following: 30

31 (a) The financial impacts and reach that diabetes of all types and 32 undiagnosed gestational diabetes are having on the programs administered by each agency and individuals, including children with 33 mothers with undiagnosed gestational diabetes, enrolled in those 34 Items in this assessment must include: (i) The number of 35 programs. lives with diabetes and undiagnosed gestational diabetes impacted or 36 37 covered by the programs administered by each agency; (ii) the number of 38 lives with diabetes, or at risk for diabetes, and family members

impacted by prevention and diabetes control programs implemented by 1 2 each agency; (iii) the financial toll or impact diabetes and its complications, and undiagnosed gestational diabetes 3 and the complications experienced during labor to children of mothers with 4 5 gestational diabetes places on these programs in comparison to other chronic diseases and conditions; and (iv) the financial toll or impact 6 7 diabetes and its complications, and diagnosed gestational diabetes and the complications experienced during labor to children of mothers with 8 9 gestational diabetes places on these programs;

10 (b) An assessment of the benefits of implemented and existing 11 programs and activities aimed at controlling all types of diabetes and 12 preventing the disease. This assessment must also document the amount 13 and source for any funding directed to each agency for the programs and 14 activities aimed at reaching those with diabetes of all types;

15 (c) A description of the level of coordination existing between the 16 agencies on activities, programmatic activities, and messaging on 17 managing, treating, or preventing all types of diabetes and its 18 complications;

(d) The development or revision of detailed policy-related action 19 plans and budget recommendations for battling diabetes and undiagnosed 20 21 gestational diabetes that includes a range of actionable items for 22 consideration by the legislature. The plans and budget recommendations must identify proposed action steps to reduce the impact of diabetes, 23 24 prediabetes, related diabetes complications, and undiagnosed 25 gestational diabetes. The plans and budget recommendations must also identify expected outcomes of the action steps proposed in the 26 27 following biennium while also establishing benchmarks for controlling and preventing all types of diabetes; and 28

(e) An estimate of savings, efficiencies, costs, and budgetary
 savings and resources required to implement the plans and budget
 recommendations identified in (d) of this subsection (17).

(18) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the authority shall identify strategies to improve patient adherence to treatment plans for diabetes and implement these strategies as a pilot through one health home program to be identified by the authority. The authority shall report to the governor and the legislature in December 2014 on the progress of strategy implementation. The authority shall report to the governor and legislature in December 2015 on patient outcomes and cost savings derived from new adherence strategies in the health home model and make recommendations for improving the strategies.

4 (19) Effective January 1, 2014, managed care contracts must 5 incorporate accountability measures that monitor patient health and 6 improved health outcomes, and shall include an expectation that each 7 patient receive a wellness examination that documents the baseline 8 health status and allows for monitoring of health improvements and 9 outcome measures.

10 (20) \$25,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014 and \$25,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are 11 12 provided solely for the development of recommendations for funding 13 integrated school nursing and outreach services. The authority shall collaborate with the office of the superintendent of public instruction 14 recommendations for increasing federal 15 to develop financial participation for providing nursing services in schools with the goals 16 17 of integrating nursing and outreach services and supporting one nurse for every four hundred fifty students in elementary schools and one 18 nurse for every seven hundred fifty students in secondary schools. 19 In developing these recommendations, the authority shall inquire with the 20 21 federal centers for medicare and medicaid services about state plan 22 amendment or waiver options for receiving additional federal matching funds for school nursing services provided to children enrolled in 23 24 apple health for kids. The recommendations shall include proposals for 25 funding training and reimbursement for nurses that provide outreach services to help eligible students enroll in apple health for kids and 26 27 other social services programs. The authority and the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall provide 28 these recommendations to the governor and the legislature by December 1, 29 30 2013.

31 (21) \$430,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 32 year 2014 and \$500,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are 33 provided solely to complete grant requirements for the health 34 information exchange.

35 (22) \$143,000 of the medicaid fraud penalty account--state 36 appropriation and \$423,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation 37 are provided solely for the rebasing of outpatient and inpatient 38 payment methods.

1 (23) \$1,163,000 of the medicaid fraud penalty account--state 2 appropriation and \$9,710,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation 3 are provided solely to implement the conversion to the tenth version of 4 the world health organization's international classification of 5 diseases.

6 (24) \$111,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 7 year 2014, \$35,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 8 year 2015, and \$359,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are 9 provided solely to update the medicaid information technology 10 architecture state self-assessment and to develop the five year road 11 map for the medicaid information technology architecture architect.

(25) \$62,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014, \$62,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015, and \$126,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to support the Robert Bree collaborative's efforts to disseminate evidence-based best practices for preventing and treating health problems.

18 (26) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the authority 19 shall increase reimbursement rates for primary care services provided 20 by independent nurse practitioners to medicare levels for the period 21 from July 1, 2013, to December 31, 2014.

22 (27) The authority shall seek a medicaid state plan amendment to create a professional services supplemental payment managed care 23 24 program for professional services delivered to managed care recipients 25 by University of Washington medicine and other public professional providers. This program shall be effective as soon as administratively 26 27 possible and shall operate concurrently with the existing professional services supplemental payment program. The authority shall apply 28 federal rules for identifying the difference between average commercial 29 rates and fee-for-service medicaid payments. This difference will be 30 31 multiplied by the number of managed care encounters and incorporated 32 into the managed care plan capitation rates by a certified actuary. The managed care plans will pay the providers the difference 33 attributable to the increased capitation rate. Participating providers 34 shall be solely responsible for providing the local funds required to 35 obtain federal matching funds. Any incremental costs incurred by the 36 37 authority in the development, implementation, and maintenance of this 38 program shall be the responsibility of the participating providers.

Participating providers shall retain the full amount of supplemental payments provided under this program, net of any costs related to the program that are disallowed due to audits or litigation against the state.

5 (28) Sufficient amounts are appropriated in this section for the 6 authority to provide an adult dental benefit beginning January 1, 2014.

7 (29) To the extent allowed under federal law, the authority shall 8 require an adult client to enroll in full medicaid coverage instead of 9 family planning-only coverage unless the client is at risk of domestic 10 violence.

(30) The authority shall facilitate enrollment under the medicaid 11 expansion for clients applying for or receiving state funded services 12 13 from the authority and its contractors. Prior to open enrollment, the authority shall coordinate with the department of social and health 14 services to provide referrals to the Washington health benefit exchange 15 16 for clients that will be ineligible for the medicaid expansion but are 17 enrolled in coverage that will be eliminated in the transition to the medicaid expansion. 18

(31) \$90,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014, \$90,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015, and \$180,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to continue operation by a nonprofit organization of a toll-free hotline that assists families to learn about and enroll in the apple health for kids program.

(32) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the authority shall reduce premiums for children with family incomes above 200 percent of the federal poverty level in the state-funded children's health program who are not eligible for coverage under the federal children's health insurance program. Premiums in the state and federal children's health insurance program shall be equal.

31 (33) The appropriations in this section reflect savings and 32 efficiencies by transferring children receiving medical care provided 33 through fee-for-service to medical care provided through managed care.

(34) \$150,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal
 year 2014, \$436,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal
 year 2015, and \$170,561,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation
 are provided solely for the provider incentive program and other
 initiatives related to the health information technology medicaid plan.

1 (35) The authority shall purchase a brand name drug when it 2 determines that the cost of the brand name drug after rebates is less 3 than the cost of generic alternatives and that purchase of the brand 4 rather than generic version can save at least \$250,000. The authority 5 may purchase generic alternatives when changes in market prices make 6 the price of the brand name drug after rebates more expensive than the 7 generic alternatives.

8 (36) The authority shall not subject antiretroviral drugs used to 9 treat HIV/AIDS, anticancer medications used to kill or slow the growth 10 of cancerous cells, antihemophilic drugs, or transplant drugs to any 11 medicaid preferred drug list or formulary for the fee-for-service 12 population.

13 (37) \$1,531,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014, \$280,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 14 year 2015, and \$10,803,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation 15 16 are provided solely to implement phase two of the project to create a 17 single provider payment system that consolidates medicaid medical and social services payments and replaces the social service payment 18 system. The amounts provided in this subsection are conditioned on the 19 20 authority satisfying the requirements of the project management oversight standards and policies established by the office of the chief 21 22 information officer.

23 (38) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the health care authority and the department of social and health services shall 24 25 implement the state option to provide health homes for enrollees with chronic conditions under section 2703 of the federal affordable care 26 27 act. The total state match for enrollees who are dually-eligible for both medicare and medicaid and not enrolled in managed care shall be no 28 more than the net savings to the state from the enhanced match rate for 29 30 its medicaid-only managed care enrollees under section 2703.

31 (39) The health care authority shall not initiate any services that 32 require expenditure of state general fund moneys unless expressly authorized in this act or other law. The health care authority may 33 seek, receive, and spend, under RCW 43.79.260 through 43.79.282, 34 federal moneys not anticipated in this act as long as the federal 35 funding does not require expenditure of state moneys for the program in 36 37 excess of amounts anticipated in this act. If the health care 38 authority receives unanticipated unrestricted federal moneys, those

moneys shall be spent for services authorized in this act or in any 1 2 other legislation providing appropriation authority, and an equal amount of appropriated state general fund moneys shall lapse. Upon the 3 lapsing of any moneys under this subsection, the office of financial 4 5 management shall notify the legislative fiscal committees. As used in this subsection, "unrestricted federal moneys" includes block grants б 7 and other funds that federal law does not require to be spent on specifically defined projects or matched on a formula basis by state 8 9 funds.

10 (40) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the authority 11 shall reimburse for primary care services provided by naturopathic 12 physicians.

(41) Within amounts appropriated, the health care authority shall conduct a review of its management and staffing structure to identify efficiencies and opportunities to reduce full time equivalent employees and other administrative costs. A report summarizing the review and the authority's recommendations to reduce costs and full time equivalent employees must be submitted to the governor and legislature by November 1, 2013.

(42) \$17,279,000 of the health benefit exchange account--state appropriation and \$2,721,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to support the operations of the Washington health benefit exchange from January 1, 2015, to June 30, 2015. The Washington state health insurance pool administrator shall transfer \$20,838,000 of pool contributions to the treasurer for deposit into the health benefit exchange account in calendar year 2014.

(43) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the authority shall continue to provide coverage after December 31, 2013, for pregnant teens that qualify under existing pregnancy medical programs, but whose eligibility for pregnancy related services would otherwise end due to the application of the new modified adjusted gross income eligibility standard.

(44) Upon implementation of the medicaid expansion under subsection (1) of this section, the breast and cervical cancer treatment program is eliminated. To maintain continuity of coverage, the authority shall offer the option to stay in a fee-for-service program to clients that are already enrolled in the breast and cervical cancer treatment program and will be transitioned into the new adult group upon

implementation of the medicaid expansion. The authority will continue to provide coverage to clients that are already enrolled in the breast and cervical cancer treatment program at the time of program elimination until their courses of treatment are completed.

(45) \$40,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 5 year 2014 and \$40,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are б 7 provided solely for the authority to create a new position to provide adequate oversight and assistance to managed care organizations, rural 8 health clinics, and federally qualified health centers under a new 9 administratively streamlined payment methodology. Effective July 1, 10 2013, or upon obtaining any necessary federal approval, but in no case 11 12 during the first quarter of a calendar year, the authority shall 13 implement an administratively streamlined payment methodology for federally qualified health centers and rural health clinics. 14 The authority's payments to managed care organizations shall include the 15 full encounter payment comprised of both the standard and enhancement 16 17 payments for federally qualified health centers and rural health clinics as defined in the medicaid state plan and in accordance with 18 section 1902(bb) of the social security act (42 U.S.C. 1396a(bb)). At 19 no time will a managed care organization be at risk for or have any 20 21 claim to the supplemental payment portion of the rate which will be 22 reconciled to ensure accurate payment and full pass through of the obligated funds. For any services eligible for encounter payments, as 23 24 defined in the medicaid state plan, managed care organizations shall be 25 required to pay at least the full published encounter rates directly to each clinic or center, and payments will be reconciled on at least an 26 27 annual basis between the managed care organization and the authority, with final review and approval by the authority. At the option of any 28 clinic, the enhancement payment can be received from the managed care 29 organization on a per member per month basis for all assigned managed 30 care enrollees in an amount prescribed by the authority. Nothing in 31 32 this section is intended to disrupt mutually agreeable contractual arrangements between managed care organizations and clinics that impact 33 how the standard payment for services is paid. The authority will 34 35 require participating managed care organizations to reimburse federally 36 qualified health centers and rural health clinics for clean claims in 37 strict adherence to the timeliness of payment standards established under contract and specified for the medicaid fee-for-service program 38

in section 1902(a)(37) of the social security act (42 U.S.C. 1 2 1396a(a)(37)), 42 C.F.R. Sec. 447.46, and specified for health carriers in WAC 284-43-321. The authority shall exercise all necessary options 3 under its existing sanctions policy to enforce timely payment of 4 claims. The authority shall ensure necessary staff and resources are 5 identified to actively monitor and enforce the timeliness and accuracy 6 7 of payments to federally qualified health centers and rural health clinics. By January 1, 2014, and after collaboration with federally 8 9 qualified health centers, rural health clinics, managed care plans, and 10 the centers for medicare and medicaid services, the authority will produce a report that provides options for a new payment methodology 11 12 that rewards innovation and outcomes over volume of services delivered, 13 and which maintains the integrity of the rural health clinic and federally qualified health center programs as outlined under federal 14 The report will detail necessary federal authority for 15 law. implementation and provide the benefits and drawbacks of each option. 16

(46) \$3,605,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014 is provided solely to proportionally reduce the amounts that rural health clinics owe the state under the calendar year 2009 recoupment.

21 (47) Sufficient amounts are appropriated in this section to remove 22 the mental health visit limit and to provide the shingles vaccine and screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment benefits that 23 24 are available in the medicaid alternative benefit plan in the current 25 medicaid benefit plan beginning January 1, 2014. The authority shall monitor the costs of the habilitative benefit as part of the 26 27 forecasting process but shall not provide this benefit in the current medicaid benefit plan without a direct appropriation in the omnibus 28 appropriations act. 29

(48) The appropriations in this section reflect savings and 30 efficiencies achieved by modifying dispensing methods of contraceptive 31 32 drugs. The authority must make arrangements for all medicaid programs offered through managed care plans or fee-for-service programs to 33 34 require dispensing of contraceptive drugs with a one-year supply 35 provided at one time unless a patient requests a smaller supply or the 36 prescribing physician instructs that the patient must receive a smaller 37 supply. Contracts with managed care plans must allow on-site dispensing of the prescribed contraceptive drugs at family planning 38

clinics. Dispensing practices must follow clinical guidelines for
 appropriate prescribing and dispensing to ensure the health of the
 patient while maximizing access to effective contraceptive drugs.

4 (49)(a) \$75,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2014 and \$75,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are 5 provided solely for preparing options with an expert consultant for 6 7 possible implementation of a targeted premium assistance program and possible implementation of the federal basic health option. \$75,000 of 8 the amounts appropriated in this subsection is provided solely for the 9 10 development of options related to the targeted premium assistance The authority shall develop options for a waiver request to 11 program. 12 the federal centers for medicare and medicaid services to implement a 13 targeted premium assistance program for the expansion adults, identified in section 1902(a)(10)(A)(i)(VIII) of the social security 14 act, with incomes above one hundred percent of the federal poverty 15 level, and for children covered in the children's health insurance 16 17 program with incomes above two hundred percent of the federal poverty level, with a goal of providing seamless coverage through the health 18 benefit exchange and improving opportunities for families to be covered 19 in the same health plans. The options must include the possibility of 20 applying premiums for individuals and cost-sharing that may exceed the 21 22 five percent of family income cap under federal law, and the options must include recommendations to make the targeted premium assistance 23 24 program cost neutral. The authority shall submit a report on the 25 options to the legislature and the governor by January 1, 2014. The 26 authority is encouraged to be creative, use subject matter experts, and 27 exhaust all possible options to achieve cost neutrality. The report shall also include a detailed plan and timeline. \$75,000 of the 28 amounts appropriated in this subsection is provided solely for the 29 development of options related to the federal basic health option. 30 The 31 authority shall prepare options for implementing the federal basic health option as federal quidance becomes available. 32 The authority shall submit a report on the options to the legislature and the 33 governor by January 1, 2014, or ninety days following the release of 34 35 federal guidance. The report must include a comparison of the premiums 36 and cost-sharing under the federal basic health option with the premium 37 assistance options described in this subsection, options for implementing the federal basic health option in combination with a 38

premium assistance program, a detailed fiscal analysis for each
 coverage approach, including the estimated costs for system design and
 implementation, and information about impacted populations.

4 (b) Where possible, the authority shall leverage the same expert 5 consultants to review each proposal and compare and contrast the 6 approaches to ensure seamless coordination with the health benefit 7 exchange.

8 (c) The authority shall collaborate with the joint select committee

All department programs should be considered by the consultant 15 regardless of whether they are included on the most recent list of 16 17 WSIPP approved identifiable evidence-based practices in (b)(i) of this subsection. 18

19 (iii) The WSIPP, in consultation with the department, shall 20 systematically review selected programs to determine the effectiveness 21 of these programs at reducing recidivism or other outcomes. The WSIPP 22 shall conduct a benefit-cost analysis of these programs when feasible 23 and shall report to the legislature by December 1, 2013.

24 (iv) Based on the report provided by the consultant and the WSIPP 25 review of programs, the department shall work collaboratively with the written 26 consultant to develop and complete a comprehensive 27 implementation plan by January 15, 2014. The implementation plan must clearly identify the types of programs to be included, the recommended 28 locations where the programs will be sited, an implementation timeline, 29 and a phasing of the projected number of participants needed to meet 30 31 the threshold of available program funds.

32 (v) Using the written implementation plan as a guide, the 33 department must have programs in place and fully phased-in no later 34 than June 30, 2015.

35 (vi) The department shall hold the consultant on retainer to assist 36 the department as needed throughout the implementation process. The 37 consultant shall review quarterly the actual implementation compared to 38 the written implementation plan and shall provide a report to the

secretary of the department. The department shall provide reports to 1 2 the office of financial management and legislative fiscal committees as follows: 3 (A) The written comprehensive implementation plan shall be provided 4 5 by January 15, 2014; and (B) Written progress updates shall be provided by July 1, 2014, and 6 7 by December 1, 2014. 19 The appropriations in this subsection are subject to the following 20 conditions and limitations:

21 (a) During the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, when contracts are established or renewed for offender pay phone and other telephone 22 23 services provided to inmates, the department shall select the 24 contractor or contractors primarily based on the following factors: (i) The lowest rate charged to both the inmate and the person paying 25 for the telephone call; and (ii) the lowest commission rates paid to 26 27 the department, while providing reasonable compensation to cover the 28 costs of the department to provide the telephone services to inmates 29 and provide sufficient revenues for the activities funded from the institutional welfare betterment account. 30

The evaluation must include an 6 analysis of lean management processes that, if adopted, could improve 7 the efficiency and cost effectiveness of inmate intake.

(d) By December 1, 2013, the department of corrections shall 8 provide a report to the office of financial management and the 9 appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the legislature that 10 evaluates the department's use of partial confinement and work release 11 12 programs and makes recommendations for improving public safety and 13 decreasing recidivism through increasing participation in partial 14 confinement re-entry and work release programs. In making its recommendations, the department shall identify: 15

16 (i) Options for increasing the capacity of work release beds to 17 meet the number of eligible offenders;

18 (ii) Potential cost savings to the state through contracting for or 19 building new work release capacity;

(iii) Options for expanding eligibility for partial confinement, including creation of a structured re-entry program that includes stable housing, mandatory participation in evidence-based programs, and intensive supervision; and

24 (iv) Potential cost savings to the state from creation of a 25 structured re-entry program.

(e) By December 1, 2013, the department of corrections shall 26 27 provide a report to the office of financial management and the appropriate fiscal and policy committees of the legislature that 28 evaluates the department's community parenting alternative program, and 29 makes recommendations for increasing participation in the program with 30 the goals of increasing public safety and decreasing recidivism. 31 The evaluation shall include recommendations for increasing the placement 32 of eligible offenders into the program and increasing eligibility to 33 34 other populations. In making its recommendations, the department shall 35 identify the percent of the eligible population currently entering the 36 program, outcomes to-date for program participants, and potential cost 37 savings from increasing placement of offenders into the program.

(f) The department of corrections shall contract with local and 1 tribal governments for the provision of jail capacity to house 2 offenders who violate the terms of their community supervision. 3 Α contract shall not have a cost of incarceration in excess of \$85 per 4 day per offender. A contract shall not have a year-to-year increase in 5 excess of three percent per year. The contracts may include rates for 6 7 the medical care of offenders which exceed the daily cost of incarceration and the limitation on year-to-year increase, provided 8 that medical payments conform to the department's offender health plan, 9 10 pharmacy formulary, and all off-site medical expenses are preapproved by department utilization management staff. 11

12 (g)(i) The legislature finds that it has taken several steps to 13 mitigate the demand for prison capacity including funding evidence-14 based programming for offenders which is proven to reduce recidivism, funding evidence-based treatment alternatives to incarceration for 15 drug-addicted offenders, standardizing inconsistencies in the drug 16 17 sentencing grid, and authorizing the department to rent local jail These steps will also assist the department's implementation of 18 beds. additional operational efficiencies by reducing costs related to 19 offender intake, processing, and transportation. 20

21 (ii) Up to \$1,119,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 22 fiscal year 2014 and up to \$1,322,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015 may be used by the department to 23 24 rent jail capacity for short-term offenders. In contracting for jail 25 beds for short-term offenders, the department shall rent capacity from local and tribal governments to house offenders with an earned release 26 27 date of less than one hundred twenty days remaining on his or her sentence at the time the offender would otherwise be transferred to a 28 state correctional facility. Local jurisdictions must provide health care to 13 offenders that meet standards set by the department. The local jail 14 will provide all medical care including unexpected emergent care. The department must utilize a screening process to ensure that offenders 15 with existing extraordinary medical/mental health needs are not 16 17 transferred to local jail facilities. If extraordinary medical conditions develop for an inmate while at a jail facility the jail may 18 transfer the offender back to the department, subject to terms of the 19 negotiated agreement. Health care costs incurred prior to transfer 20 21 will be the responsibility of the jail. The department will report to 22 legislative fiscal committees and the office of financial management by 23 November 1, 2013, to provide a status update on implementation.

24 (i) The department shall convene a work group to develop health 25 care cost containment strategies at local jail facilities. The work group shall identify cost containment strategies in place at the 26 27 department and at local jail facilities, identify the costs and benefits of implementing strategies in jail health-care facilities, and 28 make recommendations on implementing beneficial strategies. The work 29 group shall submit a report on its findings and recommendations to the 30 31 fiscal committees of the legislature by October 1, 2013. The work 32 group shall include jail administrators, representatives from health care facilities at the local jail level and the state prisons level, 33 and other representatives as deemed necessary. 34

 security prison facilities and at the Monroe correctional complex.

(k) \$23,653,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 4 5 year 2014 and \$24,919,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2015 are provided solely for offender programming. б 7 Pursuant to section 220(1) of this act, the department shall develop and implement a written comprehensive plan for offender programming 8 that prioritizes programs which follow the risk-needs-responsivity 9 model, are evidence-based, and have measurable outcomes. 10 The department is authorized to discontinue ineffective programs and to 11 12 repurpose underspent funds according to the priorities in the written plan. 13

(1) \$36,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal
year 2014 and \$36,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for
fiscal year 2015 are provided solely for implementation of Engrossed
Senate Bill No. 5484 (assault in the third-degree). If the bill is not
enacted by June 30, 2013, the amounts provided in this subsection shall

If the bill is not enacted by June 30, 2013, the amounts provided in this subsection shall lapse.

If the bill is not enacted by June 30, 2013, the amounts provided in this subsection shall lapse.

(p) \$24,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal

fiscal year 2015 are provided solely for implementation of Engrossed
 Senate Bill No. 5053 (vehicle prowling). If the bill is not enacted by
 June 30, 2013, the amounts provided in this subsection shall lapse.

8 (2) The legislature, the office of financial management, and other state agencies need consistent and accurate personnel data from 9 institutions of higher education for policy planning purposes. 10 Institutions of higher education shall report personnel data to the 11 department of personnel for inclusion in the department's data 12 Uniform reporting procedures shall be established by the 13 warehouse. office of financial management's office of the state human resources 14 director for use by the reporting institutions, including provisions 15 16 for common job classifications and common definitions of full-time 17 equivalent staff. Annual contract amounts, number of contract months, and funding sources shall be consistently reported for employees under 18 contract. 19

(3) In addition to waivers granted under the authority of RCW 21 28B.15.910, the governing boards and the state board may waive all or 22 a portion of operating fees for any student. State general fund 23 appropriations shall not be provided to replace tuition and fee revenue 24 foregone as a result of waivers granted under this subsection.

(4)(a) For institutions receiving appropriations in section 605 of 25 26 this act, the only allowable salary increases provided are those with normally occurring promotions and increases related to faculty and 27 staff retention, except as provided in section 604(4) of this act. 28 In fiscal year 2014 and fiscal year 2015, the state board for community 29 30 and technical colleges may use salary and benefit savings from faculty 31 turnover to provide salary increments and associated benefits for 32 faculty who qualify through professional development and training.

(b) For employees under the jurisdiction of chapter 41.56 RCW,
 salary increases will be in accordance with the applicable collective
 bargaining agreement. However, an increase shall not be provided to

any classified employee whose salary is above the approved salary range

3 (c) For each institution of higher education receiving 4 appropriations under sections 606 through 611 of this act:

(ii) Institutions may provide salary increases from other sources 8 to instructional and research faculty at the universities and The 9 Evergreen State College, exempt professional staff, teaching and 10 research assistants, as classified by the office of financial 11 management, and all other nonclassified staff, but not including 12 13 employees under chapter 41.80 RCW. Any salary increase granted under the authority of this subsection (4)(c)(ii) shall not be included in an 14 institution's salary base for future state funding. It is the intent 15 16 of the legislature that state general fund support for an institution 17 shall not increase during the current or any future biennium as a result of any salary increases authorized under this subsection 18 (4)(c)(ii). 19

As a result, for the 2013-14 academic year, the 31 institutions of higher education shall not adopt resident undergraduate tuition levels that are greater than the tuition levels assumed in 32 subsection (2) of this section. For the 2014-15 academic year, the 33 institutions of higher education are authorized to adopt tuition levels 34 for resident undergraduate students that are less than, equal to, or 35 36 greater than tuition levels assumed in the omnibus appropriations act 37 in subsection (2) of this section. However, to the extent that tuition 1 levels exceed the tuition levels assumed in subsection (2) of this 2 section, the institution of higher education shall be subject to the 3 conditions and limitations provided in RCW 28B.15.102.

4 (4) Each governing board is authorized to increase tuition charges

11 (6) Each governing board is authorized to adopt or increase charges 12 for fee-based, self-sustaining degree programs, credit courses, 13 noncredit workshops and courses, and special contract courses by 14 amounts judged reasonable and necessary by the governing board.

15 (7) Each governing board is authorized to adopt or increase 16 services and activities fees for all categories of students as provided 17 in RCW 28B.15.069.

18 (8) Each governing board is authorized to adopt or increase19 technology fees as provided in RCW 28B.15.069.

20 (9) Each governing board is authorized to adopt or increase special 21 course and lab fees, and health and counseling fees, to the extent 22 necessary to cover the reasonable and necessary exceptional cost of the 23 course or service.

(10) Each governing board is authorized to adopt or increase administrative fees such as, but not limited to, those charged for application, matriculation, special testing, and transcripts by amounts judged reasonable and necessary by the governing board.

(11) The state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen State College must accept the transfer of college-level courses taken by running start students if a student seeking a transfer of the college-level courses has been admitted to the state university, the regional university, or The Evergreen State College, and if the college-level courses are recognized as transferrable by the admitting institution of higher education.

(12) Appropriations in sections 606 through 611 of this act are
 sufficient to implement 2013-2015 collective bargaining agreements at
 institutions of higher education negotiated under chapter 41.80 RCW.

The institutions may also use these funds for any other purpose
 including restoring prior compensation reductions, increasing
 compensation, and implementing other collective bargaining agreements.

For the 2013-2015 fiscal biennium, when expending this 21 additional retained amount, the community and technical colleges are subject to the conditions and limitations in RCW 28B.15.102. 22

(3) For the 2013-14 and 2014-15 academic years, the state board may increase tuition fees charged to resident undergraduates enrolled in upper division applied baccalaureate programs as specified in subsection (2) of this section.

(4) Appropriations in section 605 include the restoration of the 27 three percent reduction in compensation costs taken in the 2011-2013 28 fiscal biennium. This funding is sufficient to implement 2013-2015 29 collective bargaining agreements at institutions of higher education 30 31 negotiated under chapter 41.80 RCW. The colleges may also use the restored funds for any other purpose including restoring prior 32 compensation reductions, increasing compensation, and implementing 33 other collective bargaining agreements. 34

35 (5) The state board may increase the tuition fees charged to 36 nonresident students by amounts judged reasonable and necessary by the 37 board. 1 (6) The trustees of the technical colleges are authorized to either 2 (a) increase operating fees by no more than the percentage increases 3 authorized for community colleges by the state board; or (b) fully 4 adopt the tuition fee charge schedule adopted by the state board for 5 community colleges.

The 12 trustees of the community and technical colleges are authorized to 13 increase services and activities fees up to the maximum level 14 authorized by the state board.

15 (9) The trustees of the community and technical colleges are 16 authorized to adopt or increase charges for fee-based, self-sustaining 17 programs such as summer session, international student contracts, and 18 special contract courses by amounts judged reasonable and necessary by 19 the trustees.

(10) The trustees of the community and technical colleges are authorized to adopt or increase special course and lab fees to the extent necessary to cover the reasonable and necessary exceptional cost of the course or service.

(11) The trustees of the community and technical colleges are authorized to adopt or increase administrative fees such as but not limited to those charged for application, matriculation, special testing, and transcripts by amounts judged reasonable and necessary by the trustees.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 901. EXPENDITURE AUTHORIZATIONS

The appropriations contained in this act are maximum expenditure authorizations. Pursuant to RCW 43.88.037, moneys disbursed from the treasury on the basis of a formal loan agreement shall be recorded as loans receivable and not as expenditures for accounting purposes. To the extent that moneys are disbursed on a loan basis, the corresponding appropriation shall be reduced by the amount of loan moneys disbursed from the treasury during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 902. EMERGENCY FUND ALLOCATIONS

Whenever allocations are made from the governor's emergency fund appropriation to an agency that is financed in whole or in part by other than general fund moneys, the director of financial management may direct the repayment of such allocated amount to the general fund from any balance in the fund or funds which finance the agency. An appropriation is not necessary to effect such repayment.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 903. STATUTORY APPROPRIATIONS

19 In addition to the amounts appropriated in this act for revenues 20 for distribution, and bond retirement and interest including ongoing bond registration and transfer charges, transfers, 21 interest on 22 registered warrants, and certificates of indebtedness, there is also 23 appropriated such further amounts as may be required or available for 24 these purposes under any statutory formula or under chapters 39.94 and 25 39.96 RCW or any proper bond covenant made under law.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 904. BOND EXPENSES

In addition to such other appropriations as are made by this act, there is hereby appropriated to the state finance committee from legally available bond proceeds in the applicable construction or building funds and accounts such amounts as are necessary to pay the expenses incurred in the issuance and sale of the subject bonds.

2 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 905. VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT, SEPARATION, AND

1 DOWNSHIFTING INCENTIVES

2 As a management tool to reduce costs and make more effective use of resources, while improving employee productivity and morale, agencies 3 may implement a voluntary retirement and/or separation, program that is 4 5 cost neutral or results in cost savings (including costs to the state pension systems) over a two-year period following the commencement of 6 7 the program, provided that such a program is approved by the director 8 of financial management. Agencies participating in this authorization 9 may offer voluntary retirement and/or separation incentives and options according to procedures and guidelines established by the office of 10 financial management, in consultation with the office of the state 11 human resources director and the department of retirement systems. 12 The 13 options may include, but are not limited to, financial incentives for voluntary separation or retirement. An employee does not have a 14 contractual right to a financial incentive offered under this section. 15 16 Offers shall be reviewed and monitored jointly by the office of the 17 state human resources director and the department of retirement 18 systems. Agencies are required to submit a report by July 30, 2015, to 19 the legislature and the office of financial management on the outcome 20 of their approved incentive program. The report should include 21 information on the details of the program including the incentive 22 payment amount for each participant, the total cost to the state, and 23 the projected or actual net dollar savings over the two year period.

The department of retirement systems may collect from employers the actuarial cost of any incentive provided under this program, or any other incentive to retire provided by employers to members of the state's pension systems, for deposit in the appropriate pension account.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 906. COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENTS NOT 30 IMPAIRED

Nothing in this act prohibits the expenditure of any funds by an agency or institution of the state for benefits guaranteed by any collective bargaining agreement in effect on the effective date of this section.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 907. COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENTS

36 The following sections represent the results of the 2013-2015

The amount to the department of revenue shall be used to enforce compliance with the litter tax imposed in chapter 82.19 RCW;

(b) Twenty percent to the department: (i) For local government 6 7 funding programs for waste reduction, litter control, and recycling 8 activities by cities and counties under RCW 70.93.250, to be administered by the department of ecology; and (ii) during the 2013-9 2015 biennium, to create a matching fund competitive grant program to 10 be used by local governments and nonprofit organizations for local or 11 12 statewide education programs designed to help the public with litter 13 reduction, and recycling of primarily the products taxed under chapter 82.19 RCW. Unspent funds from (a) and (c) of this subsection may be 14 applied to the competitive grant program; and 15

31 (((19))) (18) \$859,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 32 fiscal year 2012, \$979,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 33 fiscal year 2013, and \$1,841,000 of the general fund--federal 34 appropriation are provided solely to increase prior authorization 35 activities for advanced imaging procedures.

36 (((20))) <u>(19)</u> \$196,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 37 fiscal year 2012, \$246,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 38 fiscal year 2013, and \$442,000 of the general fund--federal

appropriation are provided solely to increase prior authorization
 activities for surgical procedures, which may include orthopedic
 procedures, spinal procedures and interventions, and nerve procedures.

(((21))) <u>(20)</u> \$300,000 of the general fund--private/local 4 appropriation and \$300,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation 5 are provided solely for a prescriptive practices improvement 6 7 collaborative focusing upon atypical antipsychotics and other medications commonly used in the treatment of severe and persistent 8 mental illnesses among adults. The project shall promote collaboration 9 10 among community mental health centers, other major prescribers of atypical antipsychotic medications to adults enrolled in state medical 11 assistance programs, and psychiatrists, pharmacists, and other 12 13 specialists at the University of Washington department of psychiatry and/or other research universities. The collaboration shall include 14 patient-specific prescriber consultations by psychiatrists 15 and pharmacists specializing in treatment of severe and persistent mental 16 17 illnesses among adults; production of profiles to assist prescribers and clinics in tracking their prescriptive practices and their 18 patients' medication use and adherence relative to evidence-based 19 practices guidelines, other prescribers, and patients at other clinics; 20 21 and in-service seminars at which participants can share and increase 22 their knowledge of evidence-based and other effective prescriptive practices. The health care authority shall enter into an interagency agreement with the office of the attorney general for expenditure of \$570,000 of the state's proceeds of the *cy pres* settlement in *State of Washingtonv*. *AstraZeneca* (Seroquel) for this purpose.

34 (((23))) <u>(22)</u> \$80,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 35 fiscal year 2012, \$80,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 36 fiscal year 2013, and \$160,000 of the general fund--federal 37 appropriation are provided solely to fund the Tacoma-Pierce county health department for access and outreach activities to reduce infant
 mortality.

(((24))) (23) \$75,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 3 fiscal year 2012, \$75,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 4 5 fiscal year 2013, and \$150,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to assist with development and 6 7 implementation of evidence-based strategies regarding the appropriate, safe, and effective role of C-section surgeries and early induced labor 8 in births and neonatal care. The strategies shall be identified and 9 implemented in consultation with clinical research specialists, 10 physicians, hospitals, advanced registered nurse practitioners, and 11 organizations concerned with maternal and child health. 12

13 (((25))) (24) Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the 14 health care authority shall continue to provide school-based medical 15 services by means of an intergovernmental transfer arrangement. 1 (((31))) (30) \$70,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 2 fiscal year 2012, \$70,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 3 fiscal year 2013, and \$140,000 of the general fund--federal 4 appropriation are provided solely to continue operation by a nonprofit 5 organization of a toll-free hotline that assists families to learn 6 about and enroll in the apple health for kids program.

7 (((32))) (31) \$400,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 8 fiscal year 2012 and \$400,000 of the general fund--state appropriation 9 for fiscal year 2013 is provided solely for the local outreach, case 10 management, and coordination with dental providers needed to execute 11 the access to baby and child dentistry program, which provides dental 12 care to Medicaid eligible children up to age six.

13 (((33))) <u>(32)</u> Within the amounts appropriated in this section, the 14 health care authority shall continue to provide dental services to 15 pregnant women. Services shall include preventive, routine, and 16 emergent dental care.

 report its findings to the legislature by December 1, 2012.

(((38))) (37) \$480,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 4 fiscal year 2012, \$480,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for 5 fiscal year 2013, and \$824,000 of the general fund--federal б 7 appropriation are provided solely for customer services staff. The authority will attempt to improve the phone answer rate to 40 percent 8 and reduce the response times to written questions to ten days for 9 clients and 25 days for providers. The authority will report to the 10 legislature on its progress toward achieving these goals by January 1, 11 12 2012. If the authority has not achieved these goals by July 1, 2012, 13 then the authority shall reduce expenditures on management staff in 14 order to increase expenditures on customer service staff until the qoals are achieved. 15

36 (((43))) <u>(41)</u> In order to achieve the twelve percent reduction in 37 emergency room expenditures in the fiscal year 2013 appropriations 38 provided in this section, the authority, in consultation with the

"I am returning herewith, without my approval as to Sections 103(10); 103(11); 114(3); 124(2); 124(3); 124(4); 124(5); 130(5); 148(4); 150, page 37, lines 33-36 and page 38, lines 1-7; 205(1)(e); 208(7); 213 (35); 213(36); 217(5); 219(25); 302(8); 307(15); 501(1)(a)(v); 610 (1); 610(2); and 610(8), Third Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5034 entitled:

"AN ACT Relating to fiscal matters."

Section 103(10), page 6, Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee, Study of State Agency Performance Indicators and Performance Measurement Process

This proviso directs the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee to study the effectiveness of state agency performance indicators and performance measurement processes established in Chapter 43.88 RCW, the state Budget and Accounting Act. My administration is already conducting a thorough and rigorous review of state agency performance indicators and measurements through our Results Washington initiative. I appreciate the Legislature's interest in performance management, but this review would be unnecessarily duplicative. For these reasons, I have vetoed Section 103(10).

Section 103(11), page 6, Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee, Study of Electricity Cost Impacts from Renewable Energy Standards

This proviso directs the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee to assess the cost impacts of the state's renewable electricity standards without also evaluating the economic and environmental benefits of renewable energy. The study is unnecessary, as there are cost controls built into the standards. In addition, improvements to the Energy Independence Act will also be considered through the ongoing efforts of the Climate Legislative and Executive Workgroup created in Chapter 6, Laws 2013 (E2SSB 5802). For these reasons, I have vetoed Section 103(11).

Section 114(3), page 9, Administrator for the Courts, Office of Chief Information Officer Approval of Judicial Technology Expenditures

This proviso requires the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) to work with the Office of the Chief Information Officer (OCIO) to analyze the feasibility of moving judicial branch information technology equipment into the state data center. AOC is willing to undertake this analysis, in conjunction with the OCIO, as requested. However, the proviso also prohibits AOC from expending funds appropriated for an information network hub project and computer equipment replacement unless approved by the OCIO. This limitation on AOC's appropriation authority is not necessary given AOC's commitment to work cooperatively with the OCIO. I am willing to revisit this issue, however, should the necessary analysis not proceed

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in a timely and efficient manner. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 114(3).

Sections 124(2), 124(3), 124(4), 124(5), pages 16-17, State Auditor, Audit and Evaluation Requests

The State Auditor's is requested by the Legislature to conduct various audits and evaluations on actuarial functions, managed care systems, federal compliance and fraud activity, and inmate intake and reception processes. The budget reduces the State Auditor's ability to conduct performance audits by diverting nearly \$10 million from the Performance Audits of Government Account to funds to other activities, including \$5.6 million of funding for the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee (JLARC). Initiative 900 created the Performance audits independently chosen by the State Auditor. Therefore, the State Auditor should select the audits he will perform within his limited funds. Legislatively directed audits should be performed by JLARC. For these reasons, I have vetoed Sections 124(2), 124(3), 124(4), 125 (5).

Section 130(5), page 28, Office of Financial Management, One-Stop Portal Monitoring

This proviso requires the Office of the Chief Information Officer to submit a plan to establish performance benchmarks and measuring results of implementing a one-stop integrated system for business interactions with government. A similar reporting requirement is contained in Substitute Senate Bill 5718, which passed the Legislature, making this proviso unnecessary. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 130(5).

<u>Section 148(4), page 36, Department of Enterprise Services, Building</u> <u>Code Council Aspirational Codes</u>

This proviso prohibits the State Building Code Council from working on aspirational codes, which are voluntary codes that offer builders options to demonstrate new energy efficiency measures that are economically and technically feasible. Energy efficiency is the cheapest, quickest, and cleanest way to meet rising energy needs, confront climate change, and boost our economy. Therefore, I believe the Building Code Council should continue this work for the benefit of our state's taxpayers. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 148(4). Moreover, while I have not vetoed subsection (3) of this section, the proviso attempts to amend substantive law through the budget by "modifying" the Council's statutory authority and by restricting member compensation as allowed under RCW 19.27.070. Therefore, this improper proviso does not restrict the appropriation authority or activities of the Building Code Council.

Section 150, page 37, lines 33-36 and page 38, lines 1-7, Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation, Agency Survey and Inventory Processes

The Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation is directed to report to the Legislature by December 1, 2013, and a second report by December 1, 2014, regarding the agency's survey and inventory processes No funding was provided to compile the necessary data, which is not readily available to the Department, to complete these reports. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 150, page 37, lines 33-36 and page 38, lines 1-7. However, I am directing the Department to work with interested stakeholders to provide useful and available information about the survey and inventory processes within existing resources.

Section 205(1)(e), page 61, Department of Social and Health Services, Rate Disparity Report

The Department of Social and Health Services is directed to report to the Legislature by December 31, 2013, with a strategy to reduce the rate disparity between urban and suburban residential service providers. No funding was provided to the Department and it does not currently collect the data necessary to complete the report. For this reason I have vetoed Section 205(1)(e).

Section 208(7), page 73, Department of Social and Health Services, Chemical Dependency Treatment Study

This proviso requires the Department of Social and Health Services to contract with the Washington State Institute for Public Policy (WSIPP) to study the long-term efficacy of the chemical dependency treatment program. Under Chapter 338, Laws of 2013 (2SSB 5732), WSIPP will develop an inventory of evidence-based and research-based prevention and intervention services for the Department to use in preparing a behavioral health improvement strategy. Additionally, no funding is provided to the Department to contract for this study. For these reasons, I have vetoed Section 208(7).

Section 213(35), page 88, Health Care Authority, Rebates for Brand Name Drugs

This proviso requires the Health Care Authority to purchase brand name drugs when it determines the cost of the brand name drug after rebate is less than the cost of generic alternatives and that the purchase of the brand rather than generic version can save at least \$250,000. The state has made a concerted effort to reduce pharmaceutical drug costs through increasing generic drug use when clinically appropriate. This requirement is administratively burdensome to implement and will likely result in increased costs rather than savings. For these reasons I have vetoed section 213(35).

Section 213(36), page 88, Health Care Authority, Preferred Drug List Exclusions

This proviso prohibits the Health Care Authority from including specific drugs in the Medicaid preferred drug list for the fee-forservice population. This proviso is in direct conflict with the state's goal of ensuring that our expenditures on services, devices, and medications provide the greatest health benefit for employees and clients. Excluding classes of drugs from evidence-based medicine is inconsistent with improving health care quality and reducing costs. For this reason I have vetoed Section 213(36).

Section 217(5), page 96, Department of Labor and Industries; Section 219(25), page 105, Department of Health; Section 302(8), pages 119-120, Department of Ecology; Formal Review Process Existing Rules

These provisos require the Departments of Labor and Industries, Health, and Ecology to establish and perform a formal review process of its existing rules within existing funds. A similar reporting requirement is included in SSB 5679, which passed the Legislature, making these provisos unnecessary. For this reason, I have vetoed Sections 217(5), 219(25), and 302(8).

<u>Section 307(15), pages 126-127, Department of Fish and Wildlife.</u> Payments in Lieu of Taxes Methodology

The Department of Fish and Wildlife is directed to develop and submit a revised payment methodology for certain counties that receive payments in lieu of taxes (PILT) for game lands managed by the Department. The revised methodology is directed to provide supplemental payments to these counties. I believe a comprehensive review of PILT for game lands should be conducted without any predetermined outcome. Therefore, I am directing the Department of Revenue to work with the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Office of Financial Management to examine the current PILT methodologies, as well as methodologies used by other states and the federal government, to develop by December 1, 2013, options and recommendations to revise the PILT program. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 307(15).

Section 501(1)(a)(v), page 136, Superintendent of Public Instruction This proviso requires the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to review career and technical education and skill center formulas by October 1, 2013. The due date does not provide enough time for staff to accomplish the task. The Superintendent has expressed a commitment to completing the review by June 1, 2014. For these reasons, I have vetoed Section 501(1)(a)(v).

Section 610(1), page 190, The Evergreen State College, Extraordinary Foster Care Cost Study

This proviso directs the Washington State Institute for Public Policy to examine the extraordinary costs of individual foster care children to identify whether the cost of placements is consistent across similarly acute children. The Children's Administration of the Department of Social and Health Services routinely evaluates high cost placements and services but must make decisions based on the unique needs of each child. A study is not necessary at this time. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 610(1).

<u>Section 610(2), page 190, The Evergreen State College, Safety</u> <u>Assessment Tool Study</u>

This proviso directs the Washington State Institute for Public Policy to conduct an empirical study of the validity and reliability of the safety assessment tool used by the Children's Administration of the Department of Social and Health Services. The Department is currently evaluating the assessment tool as it implements the family assessment response system required by Chapter 259, Laws 2012 (ESSB 6555). A study at this time would be premature when the Department has not yet determined whether the assessment tool will continue to be used, modified or maintained. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 610(2).

<u>Section_610(8), page_191-192, The_Evergreen_State_College, K-12</u> <u>Funding Task Force</u>

This proviso establishes an eleven member task force on K-12 funding, to be staffed by the Washington State Institute for Public Policy. The task force is to examine and provide options on the following topics: salary allocation methodologies, career and technical education, and the appropriate use of state and local property taxes to finance public schools. Within the past three years, legislatively authorized working groups have conducted thorough reviews of compensation, career and technical education, and use of local levies. Another task force is duplicative of proposals from recent workgroups. For this reason, I have vetoed Section 610(8).

For these reasons I have vetoed Sections 103(10); 103(11); 114(3); 124 (2); 124(3); 124(4); 124(5); 130(5); 148(4); 150, page 37, lines 33-36 and page 38, lines 1-7; 205(1)(e); 208(7); 213(35); 213(36); 217(5); 219(25); 302(8); 307(15); 501(1)(a)(v); 610 (1); 610 (2); and 610(8) of Third Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5034.
